## ANIMAL JUMPERS: WHO ARE THE CHAMPS?

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Dear Scholastic News editors,

In one of the articles of your Vol. 63, No. 3, Edition 4 (September 18, 2000), on page 2 you stated that a grasshopper is proportionally the best jumper in the animal kingdom because it can jump 2 feet high and 4 feet forward. A grasshopper is, on average, about 1 inch long. There are 48 inches in 4 feet; thus, a grasshopper can jump about 48 times its length.

In the <u>National Geographic</u>, Vol. 173, No. 5 (May 1988), on page 673, it states that a flea can jump 150 times its own length. Therefore, proportionally a flea is a better jumper than a grasshopper—about three times better, if you simply do the math!

I thought you would like to know about this, and I would even suggest that you print a correction in a forthcoming issue of <u>Scholastic News</u>. I am not the only one who noted this small error.

Please do not take this letter as a general criticism. You can consider me a happy reader and a loyal subscriber.
